## **RURAL LARNED**

Dipman House - 1880\* 8 miles West and 3.25 North is the twostory farmhouse that has been in the Dipman family since it was built.

Converse House - 1917\* 4 miles South and 3/4 mile East of Sanford is this two-story farmhouse owned by the Converse family.

# GARFIELD, KS

1st house S. of town - Circa 1910\* A two-story Victorian house built by C.D. Meade that features porches on East and North. It has a central staircase with much original woodwork.

2 miles W., 1.5 miles S. - 1911\* Two-story frame farmhouse built by Oscar Dahlquist. He built it to give with the wind-like houses he had seen in California.

## ROZEL, KS

2 miles N. of Hwy. 156 at Rozel, 1.75 miles E. - 1909\* Farmhouse built by J.H. & Florence Hoover. House has been remodeled.

SW of Baptist Church - 1910\* Frame house built for W.R. Yeager, it is the American 4-square style that was the first modern house in town. This was the mortuary for many years.

## **BURDETT, KS**

602 Elm - Circa 1900<sup>\*</sup> House built for George Norris featuring a wrap-around porch.

201 Maple - Circa 1910\* Victorian Style house known as the R.M. Norris home. Norris was an original founder of the bank, lumber yard, and grain co. in Burdett.

# LARNED, KS

#### 1120 Toles - 1876\*

Built by Presbyterian minister Rev. Strudevant, whose wife was the niece of Zebulon Pike. Originally had a front porch that circled the entire house.

#### 423 Morris - 1878\*

House foundation started in 1878 of stone taken from a nearby quarry. The dwelling is built on the same plan as the office quarters at Fort Larned. The home was known as "Hillcrest" where Capt. C.A. Morris and his family lived until 1894.

### E. of Larned - 1882\*

Two story frame structure built for Captain Henry Booth. A land patent was taken out in 1879 and a loan was made on the property in 1880-1. Booth was the first mayor and organizer of Larned later serving as speaker of the Kansas House of Representatives.

530 W. 5th St. - Circa 1883\* It is believed that the Mansard Style Victorian house was built by the Mansfields who were said to be English nobility. The house plan is the same as was used for officers quarters at Fort Larned.

## 1021 Broadway - 1885

Built for Hon. Judge W.C. Edwards, a noted politician & attorney. Two story Italianate style house with a brick tower. The house was built for \$9,000.

## 417 W. 7th St. - Circa 1885\*

Known as the Bennyworth house, it was originally at 7th and State. The family building it wanted the living room large enough to seat the entire Methodist Sunday School Class.

### 905 Main - 1886\*

The Dr. C.C. Miller home built with mansard roof on the Second Empire style, constructed of bricks, contains 9 rooms. All windows are plate glass and the house has a wrap-around front porch.

### 617 Santa Fe - 1886\*

Reverend Bartle built a two-story frame home containing 7 or 8 rooms constructed for approx. \$1,600.

### 623 Santa Fe - 1886\*

The residence was built for Louie Wolf who owned a dry goods firm Wolf & Landauer. The frame house featured two parlors along with a sitting and dining room in a front-facing L shaped plan. Originally the woodwork was oil pine and the ceiling stucco.

#### 523 Kansas - 1886\*

The Colonel A.J. Alexander home is a frame, story and a half with 8 rooms. The portico was placed to give a view of the city.

#### 721 State - 1886\*

Built for Ira B. Cunningham, the mansard roof on the Second Empire styled home has 8 rooms and was the home of attorney George Finney through the 1940s. The house is brick veneer with an east front.

#### 404 W. 4th St. - 1886\*

Originally a one-story frame house with 6 rooms built for T.J. Owens, the now stone house has been altered over the years.

#### 324 W. 5th St. - 1886\*

Known for the owner C.W. Dunaway, the 10 room Victorian style brick structure features a double window with a view of the Arkansas River. One of the first homes in Larned with hot and cold running water.

## 423 W. 5th St. - 1886\*

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places as the Babbitt-Doerr house Queen Anne style, originally the Wadsworth house, built of KC pressed brick on a stone foundation. Owned by Babbitt, who was in the lumber business, and the Doerr family who owned several local businesses and active in local and state politics.

### 323 W. 6th St. - 1886\*

Eight room Victorian house built of brick veneer, known as the Dr. J.M. Cummins home. The lower level has pocket doors that allow for the entire main part of the building to be one room.

### 423 W. 7th St. - 1886\*

Built for Mr. Sara Macky, the two-story house also had an 8x10 coal house. The frame house is a rear facing 'L' plan.

### 519 W. 4th St. - 1909\*

Built by C.A. Scherzer, sold in 1922 to E.E. Fritzell, a state politician and local rancher.

### 527 W. 4th St. - 1909\*

Craftsman Bungalow home that was built for rancher Charles Glassgo and later traded for a cattle ranch in New Mexico. The house is two stories with rock foundation and a porch on the north, now used as a garage.

## 603 State - 1912\*

House built for H.T. Taylor, Pawnee Co. abstractor. Before construction was started, he discovered the architect who had been hired planned to use the same plan for his house as was being built one block north. Mr. Taylor changed the plans extensively, but the style is Elclectic Neoclassical.

## 707 State - 1912

Built for John Edwards, this is a three-story brick house with full-height entry porch, Neoclassical Style.
